Chiropractor Aims To Elevate Quality Of Life ... For Humans And Animals

Carolyn Longacre was only 9 years old when she declared her ambition to become a veterinarian. She fulfilled that pledge to treat animals – in a far different way than she imagined.

She doesn't care for cats and dogs and cows and chickens and other critters as a veterinarian; she cares for them – and people – as a chiropractor.

"I help humans and their pets with their health goals, with nutrition or chiropractic care," says Longacre, who founded Evergreen Chiropractic and Wellness in Greenville in 2017.

"Chiropractic is the most important to me. We can exercise. We can eat right. Those are great things." But she says healthy habits alone can't correct problems when inflammation or trauma interferes with the nerves in the spine that send signals to every part of the body.

Longacre compares the nervous system to the wiring in a house; all electrical signals must function so the home can function.

"In people, things like trauma can flip that switch or cut that wire, and the body won't run properly," she says. "We have a brain and the spinal cord, and those electrical wires go to everything in our body. Muscles, tendons, bones, organs."

When the nervous system is out of sync, Longacre says, people may experience pain, loss of mobility and illness.

To relieve pain and help the body function more effectively, chiropractors perform adjustments – a hands-on technique to improve spinal alignment and reduce interference to and from nerves, Longacre says.

Pharmaceuticals might provide only temporary relief or cause side effects.

"We're not putting anything into the body. We're not doing anything drastic. We're optimizing the function," says Longacre, who lives in Greenville with her husband, young daughters, three cats and two dogs.

Before treatment, she also studies a

new patient's lab work, X-rays and medical records.

"What we do is usually very gentle and specific," she says. "We even work with babies."

That includes Longacre's own newborns. "I told the nurse, 'I'm going to adjust my baby now.'" She says the "horrified" nurse relaxed as she pressed lightly on the first vertebrae of the baby's neck. "My babies calmed down and melted in my hands."

Growing up on a farm, Longacre didn't care about babies – much less chiropractic treatments. "I had pigs, rabbits, chickens, cats and dogs. I loved that. I wanted to be a vet," she says.

She discovered that her dream no longer matched her reality when she took a job at a veterinary clinic while attending Western Carolina University. She says the cruelty and neglect sometimes inflicted on pets and farm animals left clinicians unhappy and even depressed.

She decided to find a new path – and found it after her father injured his back.

"He couldn't move or sit or lie down," Longacre says.

As a contractor, being unable to work meant missing deadlines and losing money. He had long used steroids and the couch to ease chronic backaches. "That's what people told you to do. That's not what you should do," she says.

Longacre's father turned to a chiropractor because "he didn't have another choice." She drove him to appointments, and he healed gradually. Curious, she watched a session.

"The doctor was joyous. It blew my mind. I asked all sorts of questions." She shadowed the chiropractor for months.

"Some people had had five back surgeries. That's a health crisis in itself. But people got better. The success stories were amazing. People weren't upset when they went in; they weren't upset when they left," she says.

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Longacre finished her bachelor's degrees in biology and chemistry in 2005 and enrolled in chiropractic school at Life University in Marietta, Georgia.

"If my dad hadn't gotten injured, I wouldn't have thought about chiropractic school," she says.

"It was bittersweet because he died in an accident as a contractor.

"He is part of my why."

After Longacre earned her doctorate of chiropractic, she says her ex-husband's military career proved pivotal in defining her mission.

"I treated his buddies and saw crazy stuff. One guy was 21 and had a back injury. They did surgery. Then he was useless to the military. They discharged him," she explains.

"They destroyed that young man's life. Surgery is permanent, which is why we wait until the last minute to do it."

Active duty military and veterans experience physical and mental trauma, she says. "Those people are not treated well within the military system."

Though caring for veterans became part of her purpose, Longacre ultimately fled her abusive marriage.

"That was so hard," she says.

"Now, I don't think any part of life is in vain. I have helped so many women get out of abusive situations. Sometimes it starts with a chiropractic adjustment. Women with PTSD ... It's an invisible condition. I learn people's deep, dark secrets and traumas."

Longacre offers support and resources and sometimes refers a patient to a therapist, an attorney or a physician.

Though she cares for anyone with pain or illness, she is especially drawn to help veterans and people with nightmares or migraines or PTSD. "I want to work on the patients who everybody is hesitant to work on because they have scoliosis or bars or screws in their bodies. They probably need help the most."

And now, she treats pets and farm animals, too.

"It was my veterinarian girl dream," she says.

Longacre completed hundreds of hours of additional training in animal chiropractic, food animal adjusting, canine and equine chiropractic, and certification from the American Veterinary Chiropractic Association.

Evergreen Chiropractic is large and bright, with separate rooms for people, animals, nutritional counseling and a host of other services.

Owners bring pets that have stopped eating or moving, have lost their hair or are sick from illness or toxins or heat.

Longacre says she helps pets become healthy and stay healthy for the sake of the animals and the people who love them.

"Ultimately, I want to have a healthier community – not just people, but animals as well."

Treating farm animals is also a way to produce healthier meat, eggs and dairy products, she says.

"When I saw how empowering it could be to help people in a full circle, I knew that was where I wanted to land."

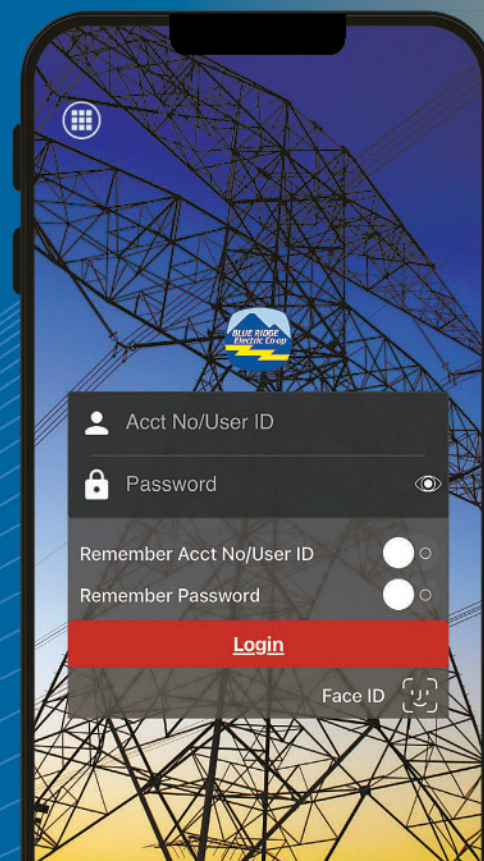

Size

A porch is an accessory, so it shouldn't overwhelm the house's main structure. Think of your porch as an extension of your home, a space that seamlessly blends with the rest of your property. If you don't consider size, it may look like a poorly designed afterthought.

Experts also recommend thinking about how you envision using your porch. Do you plan to dine al fresco with your family during mild or warm weather months? If so, you'll want a porch at least eight to 10 feet deep to accommodate a table and chairs. If you picture yourself spending the evening unwinding on your porch to watch the sunset, place your porch facing west. Early risers who enjoy reading the newspaper and drinking coffee may want to use maximum light with eastern exposure.

Remember to be intentional with the access point of the porch from your home, the design may have an impact on the interior rooms. For example, you may want to install French or sliding glass doors from the living room or kitchen to create an entrance to the porch.

Features

If possible, consider using the same materials on your porch as those on the exterior of your home. This continuity will not only enhance the aesthetic appeal of your outdoor space but also create a sense of unity in your property. Another way to create a harmonious porch is to coordinate the millwork and other design elements, ensuring they integrate smoothly with the rest of your home.

When designing your porch, it's crucial to consider practical factors such as climate and comfort. If you live in an area with a high insect population, installing screens can help you enjoy your porch without any unwanted guests. If you plan to use your porch in the evenings, adding lighting options or outlets for lamps to your feature list can create a cozy atmosphere. And for those hot summer days, a ceiling fan can keep the porch area cool and comfortable.

NAR Pending Home Sales Report Shows 0.8% Decrease in June

Pending home sales decreased by 0.8% in June from the prior month and 2.8% year-over-year, according to the National Association of REALTORS® Pending Home Sales report. The Report provides the real estate ecosystem, including agents and homebuyers and sellers, with data on the level of home sales under contract.

Month-over-month and year-over-year pending sales declined in the Midwest, South, and West. In the Northeast, pending sales rose month-over-month but remained flat year-over-year. The

REALTORS® Confidence Index shows a 4% and 6% year-over-year increase in homebuyer and seller traffic, respectively.

"The data shows a continuation of small declines in contract signings despite inventory in the market increasing. Pending sales in the Northeast increased incrementally even though home price growth in the region has been the strongest in the country," said Elonda Sherman, 2025 President of The Greater Greenville Association of Realtors® and Broker-In-Charge of E Real Estate, LLC in Simpsonville, SC.

"The REALTORS® Confidence Index shows early indications of potential contract signings increasing moving forward. REALTORS® are optimistic that homebuying and selling activity will increase. That confidence is supported by the fact that mortgage applications have been rising."
